IAN: It's hanging upside down.

THOMAS: It's swinging back and forth.

JACKSON: It's making a J.

CHARLIE N: It's getting bigger.

CHARLIE S: Because it sticked onto that thing right there. The web.

It's getting smaller.

IAN: Actually it's untangling

RUTH: Actually it's falling apart.

IAN: Actually I think it's turning its neck straight.

Yeah, it's turning bigger.

THOMAS: I think he just pick that out, right?

CAROLINE: When will it get out of its cocoon?

EMILY: Oh, you think it's in a cocoon?

CHILDREN: No.

RUTH: I think it's making a cocoon.

LUCA: I said it was making a cocoon.

CAROLINE: It's getting fatter. It's head is getting fatter.

They have cocoons already.

LUCA: Caterpillars that are hanging don't have cocoons, butterflies have cocoons.

Why does it just keep wiggling?

LOUIS: When butterflies hatch they don't have a cocoon again.

LUCA: I know that.

LOUIS: But why did you say butterflies have cocoons?

THOMAS: I think it's trying to pull itself up.

RUTH: Maybe this will be the cocoon and then the cocoon broke.

EMILY: Oh, Thomas said it might be trying to pull itself up.

THOMAS: Look, look, it's swinging back and forth to try and get to the top.

LAURI: Oh, do you ever do that on a tree Thomas? Swing back and forth and try to pull yourself up?

THOMAS: Yeah.

KIERAN: And when I climb I pull. When I'm climbing, I'm trying to pull myself up.

LAURI: Do you ever swing back and forth?

KIERAN: Nods.

KATIE: I play on this playground that have the same thing where you can do a flip and you swing backwards...I jump and pull myself up.

RUTH: Everyone look.

EMILY: Ruth is saying, everyone, watch the screen. What do you see?

IAN: You see it untangling.

It's getting bigger.

KATIE: No, It's growing.

IAN: And it's turning its neck.

It's not.

TRAVERS: No, no. That's the inside of him.
